Homicide Investigation

The Birmingham Police Department is conducting a homicide investigation. The incident occurred on **Monday**, **August 7**, **2023**.

The victim has been identified as:

Darcy Joseph, (33), B/M, of Hueytown, Alabama.

Just after 8:00 p.m., East Precinct officers were dispatched to the 5000 Block of 41st Way North on report of Shots Fired.

Officers arrived on the scene and entered an alleyway when they observed a vehicle that had been shot into. Upon further investigation, officers observed the victim unresponsive inside the vehicle suffering from an apparent gunshot wound.

Birmingham Fire and Rescue personnel arrived on the scene and pronounced the victim deceased.

The preliminary investigation suggests the victim was in an alleyway where individuals are known to hang out.

There is no one in custody.

This is Birmingham's 75th murder investigation of 2023 with 7 justifiable death investigations). The Department's understanding of the facts and circumstances may change as additional evidence is collected and analyzed
